CASE STUDY

The case study will incorporate the following elements in the description of the case:

- background, including socioeconomic (population, geographical distribution, country income group, burden of diseases) and health and care workforce description in a hypothetical setting (stock and flow of health workers, health and care workforce density (urban versus rural), nurse-to-doctor ratio ...);
- education (number of annual graduates, proportion of new graduates entering rural practice, continuing professional development description ...);
- regulation (scope-of-practice description, provision of scholarships ...);
- · support (infrastructure, working environment ...); and
- outcomes: health and care workforce (turnover rate, vacancy rate, duration/proportion of stay in rural area); satisfaction (health and care worker and population); coverage (percentage of unmet need); referral time; health outcomes (mortality).

FACILITATOR

The facilitator of the session will take into account the following elements:

- an appropriate bundle of interventions should be selected, taking into account the specific context described in the case study;
- success in improving access to health and care workers in rural and remote areas depends on the
 selection of appropriate, context-relevant, feasible, acceptable and affordable interventions from the
 menu of evidence-informed recommendations presented in the WHO guideline on health workforce
 development, attraction, recruitment and retention in rural and remote areas;
- the right selection and coordinated implementation of those interventions will yield more sustained improvements than implementing all of the recommendations, or trying to address attraction, recruitment and retention in a fragmented fashion; and
- indicators to measure success, or at least progress, also need to be agreed upon from the early planning stage.
